
Why are Healthy Oak Ecosystems Important?

Oak ecosystems like oak savannas, woodlands, and forests were once the predominant land cover of the region. These important ecosystems:

- Provide habitat and food sources for wildlife, many of which are rare today due to historical losses and ongoing decline in the health of oak ecosystems.
- Support a high biodiversity of plants and wildlife.
- Improve air quality, absorb rainfall, assist with flood control, and store carbon.
